

From The Church

Following Jesus – what's it all about? Like a lot of you reading this, I've been a Christian, a follower of Jesus for most of my life now, that's a very long time and yet I am still surprised at some of the ways my prayers get answered. I can testify to God's faithfulness throughout all those years and give many examples of the times he has carried me through a difficult time, an illness, the loss of a loved one, not getting the job I really wanted and so on.

I can also tell you of all the joyful occasions, when something I really wanted to happen, but thought was very unlikely, actually happened. Oh, the joy of that moment! It must have been a bit like that when Peter, James and John and the other fishermen cast their nets on the other side of their boat.

A few years ago, while I was on pilgrimage in the Holy Land we were on a fishing boat on the sea of Galilee being taught by a modern-day fisherman how to cast our nets ... it's a longstanding tradition in that area and there is a real art to it.

We read the story of the fishermen from Luke Chapter 5 and it struck me that though these men were experts who had been fishing these waters all their lives, Jesus was asking them to do something completely different.

And even though they had 'worked hard all night and hadn't caught anything'. (Luke 5 v 5) Even though they had given up and were washing their nets. Even though they were confident that their own methods had worked well in the past: when Jesus told them to do something completely different they listened and their obedience paid dividends. These were professional fishermen able to support themselves and their families by their expertise on Lake Galilee, but they also knew it was important to listen to what Jesus was telling them. After that day things would never be the same for them again. Their special skills would not be wasted, but instead would be channelled into a far more fulfilling and exciting vocation.

'Do not be afraid', Jesus told them, 'From now on you will be fishers of people.' Luke 5 v 10 $\,$

Then they followed Jesus and became his first disciples, they were engaged in ministry from that day on, these unlikely heroes spent time with Jesus and learned from him. Despite all their weaknesses they became ardent followers of Jesus, faithful to the end, let's not forget that it was three of these: Simon, James and John who ended up being with Jesus at the transfiguration. Simon Peter, despite his impetuousness and all his doubts and fears eventually becoming the first to be ordained by Jesus as a healer and faithful teacher of the faith. Their lives changed completely the day they listened to Jesus and cast their nets on the other side of the boat. Things would never be the same for them.

Is Jesus asking you to do something different in your life? Be bold, listen to him, read and pray and if that's the case then be excited, as Jesus says 'Do not be afraid'.



A letter from Dorset County Councillor Will Chakawhata

My name is Will Chakawhata, and I am proud to serve as your councillor for Stour and Allen Vale. It is a role I took on in May 2023 following the exceptional service of Robin Cook. Since moving from Zimbabwe over 30 years ago, Dorset has been my home for 25 years, and for the past decade, I have lived in Wimborne with my partner and two sons, Elijah and Jacob, who attend local schools. My son Elijah played for Sturminster Marshall for many years, and I got to know many parents who became personal friends. Like many of you, I juggle work and family life demands, sharing the same hopes and challenges as any other parent and resident in our community.

With a career spanning over 25 years in the NHS, my focus has been on mental health governance and leadership. I have also served as a magistrate for 12 years and worked as an independent chair with the former Dorset Police and Crime Commissioner for three years, improving performance. These roles have taught me the value of listening, problem-solving, and bringing people together to achieve meaningful results.

My priorities in Sturminster Marshall, Shapwick, Pamphill and Cowgrove are clear: wellbeing, road safety, and sustainability. The pandemic brought mental health into sharp focus, especially for young and vulnerable people. We must ensure our community has the support it needs to thrive. Even simple things like walking and listening to music are vital ways to recharge. I encourage everyone to prioritise their well-being.

Road safety is one of the most urgent challenges we face. Speeding and poor parking on Newton Road, Mill Lane, King Street and High Street in Sturminster Marshall remain key concerns. At a meeting with over 30 residents during a joint ward councillor and Dorset Police surgery on I February 2025 these issues dominated discussions.

We must act. Blocked drains and flooding require urgent attention. Ditches and drains covered with silt must be cleared. Traffic calming measures and traffic lights at Mill Lane are necessary to improve safety. Parking near the school and shop needs better regulation, with calls for yellow lines to prevent unsafe conditions. The industrial estate is impacting local streets with overflow parking, including zigzag lines near the school, creating risks. Builders starting work at seven in the morning is another frustration. Residents are questioning if this aligns with planning conditions and there are growing concerns over contractor vehicles blocking roads. On the High Street, restricted parking is preventing buses from getting through. Leaves are not being cleared, creating muddy and slippery conditions near the Memorial Hall. Traffic restrictions during school runs are needed for safety.

Sustainability is another area where we all have a role to play. I have made changes like moving to an electric vehicle and using public transport whenever possible. These actions might seem small, but collectively, they matter. While not everyone can make the same choices, we can all contribute in ways that help protect our planet for future generations.

But above all, my focus is on you. I want to connect with you, hear your concerns, learn from your experiences, and work with you to find solutions that make a difference. I aim to foster a community where everyone feels heard, valued, and empowered to shape our future.



Kingston Lacy Estate News

We are definitely welcoming February at Kingston Lacy in hopes of some drier weather. Our current, temporary car park has suffered in the wet, and under pressure from the numbers of visitors drawn by the annual stunning show of snowdrops.

The good news is the construction work is continuing apace on the new car park – if you've visited recently, you'll have seen we have already opened a small area behind the fencing for staff parking, freeing up more spaces for visitors. You can see the parking bays starting to take shape, though there's still plenty to do on the walkways and lanes, and although it's a bit hidden behind trees you can also see the shape of the new reception building now the steels have gone in.

This major infrastructure project, which also encompasses new toilets (including two disabled loos, with facilities for adult changing) and better access for wheelchair and buggy users, is on schedule for completion by the end of the year. We hope to be able to open the new car park before then, and the improvements will set up Kingston Lacy for the future, with the facilities visitors expect. You can find out more about this Access for All project on the website.

Elsewhere, we are dreaming of the coming year – bookings have opened for two of the four outdoor theatre performances coming to Kingston Lacy. We're welcoming back Illyria with family favourite 'The Wind in the Willows' (7 August) and Lord Chamberlain's Men is bringing the Shakespearian comedy 'Twelfth Night' (17 and 18 July). There will also be a performance of 'Macbeth' from the Duke's Theatre Company on 25 June.

But, of course, there's plenty going on before then, with a big focus on the Japanese Garden which turns 20 this year. And though it's a bit early to be talking about Easter, get the date in your diaries; the egg-tremely good fun starts at the beginning of April.



Decimalisation in Britain

Prior to 1971, there were 12 pennies to the shilling and 20 shillings to the

pound. There were guineas, half crowns, threepenny bits, sixpences and florins. This old system of currency, known as pounds, shillings and pence or



lsd, dated back to Roman times when a pound of silver was divided into



240 pence, or denarius, which is where the 'd' in 'lsd' comes from. (lsd =librum, solidus, denarius)

To prepare the nation for the

changeover in currency systems, the Decimal Currency Board (DCB) was set up, running a public information campaign in the two years prior to the switchover on Monday 15 February 1971, also known as Decimal Day. Three years before changeover, new 5p and 10p coins were introduced; these were the same size and worth the same amount as the one and two shilling coins. In 1969 a new 50p coin was introduced to replace the old 10 bob (shilling) note.

The banks were closed for four days before changeover to prepare. Currency converters were available for everyone, and prices in the shops were shown in both currencies. Decimal Day' ran without a hitch. Although the phrase "How much is that in old money?" was heard for some years after.

For a short time the old and new currencies operated in unison, whereby people could pay in pounds, shillings and pence and receive new money as change. Originally it was planned that old money would be phased out of circulation over eighteen months, but as it turned out, the old penny, halfpenny and threepenny coins were officially taken out of circulation as early as August 1971.

Whilst various names for a new unit of currency had been suggested – such as the new pound, the royal or the noble – it was decided that as a reserve currency, the pound sterling was too important to lose.

We have had an incidence of riders cantering/galloping their ponies on Churchill Close Green, this is not allowed under the bylaws. Please can you let anyone you know who owns a pony or horse in the area that this is prohibited, and is a safety issue for the public.

The metal Silent Soldier opposite the War Memorial on the corner of the High Street and King Street is sadly damaged beyond repair and has been taken down. The Parish Council will investigate a replacement. The benches around Churchill Close Green are going to be refurbished and one will be temporarily removed for renovation. There is still some outstanding work to the Play Area on the Green, but most has been completed.

The wet weather has continued and has caused a few issues with sewerage and flooding in the Parish, although as I write it has turned colder but there is still dampness in the air. The winter is still biting us and reminding us to wrap up warm and keep an eye on elderly neighbours. The trees on Stocks, Maypole and Trafalgar Green are being assessed along with the Maypole as part of the Annual Tree Survey for any works required. The new Cattle Signs are now in place in Mill Lane to remind motorists, and the Speedwatch group are active in the Parish which is good news. We are very grateful to these volunteers for giving up their time to support this valuable community resource. We have regular meetings with the Community Highways Officer to discuss various issues in the Parish including sunken manholes, cleaning of road signs, A350 flooding, road sweeping effectiveness, blocked drains, yellow lines and the Bus Stop repainting to name but a few. If you see anything that you feel needs reporting please get in touch with the Parish Clerk, the contact details are on the Web site mention above.

Dog Fouling is on the increase again sadly, and the dog wardens are carrying out additional patrols across Dorset. Please report any offences you witness online on the Dorset Council website. 

Making More From Less - by Lys de Bray

As I write this in February I'm so happy to see the first snowdrops - *Galanthus nivalis* - just coming into bloom. These are the 'ordinary' ones, though there is nothing ordinary about a snowdrop, and when you see the first ones out you'll know that spring is almost but not quite here. You can get taller, bigger ones and doubles, too, but I'm quite happy with what I've got. In your own garden mark the place, because they'll disappear quickly once the flowers are over.

You have three choices now:

I) Leave them where they are, allowing the seeds to ripen and fall naturally, though they'll

(2) Once the leaves have withered lift the plant, tease the cluster of bulbs apart and replant in small groups,

(3) If you want dozens of snowdrops then it might be fun to try the following method. Allow to set seed, wait for this t to ripen and sow in seed trays of compost in an open cold frame in a partly shaded position. Little green shoots will appear in due course and if you lift one out you will see that tiny bulbs are forming. (Always a great moment, this!) Allow to grow on for a season for larger bulbs to form which are easier to handle. There are many named varieties of snowdrop, some with double flowers, and if your local garden centres haven't got what you want you can send from one of the specialist nurseries, see below. Other small spring-flowering bulbs can be treated in the same way.

As I write, wild primroses are popping up everywhere and if you've got the sort of garden that I have, you'll see the very recognisable leaf-rosettes everywhere. Leave the larger clumps undisturbed to flower where they are; but dig the small ones up and replant where you would like them to flower next year. Shade these until they're established.. If you've got some really large clumps, wait until flowering time is over and then lift and divide them to make as many little three-stemmed clumps as you can, each with a root. You can do this with some named varieties of primula, such as Primula 'Wanda,' my favourite, which is a brilliant, vivid magenta, but don't try it with the single-stemmed polyanthus.

Everybody loves bluebells, and to see (and smell) a spring woodland carpeted with them is a magical sight, and if you' re walking among them it's even better, but please do keep to the path if there is one The bird song, the sun shining through the leafing trees - magic. Occasionally you may see a white-flowered bluebell - what would you call it? 'Whitebell is so clumsy. Please don't try to dig it up - it's illegal. What you could do if you see a white-flowering bluebell is to tie a string round a small stick with a dated label on it and push it into the ground by the 'Whitebell' and wait until all the flowers are over and setting seed. (When this rattles, it's ripe and you can take a head of seed) You can then copy nature and sow immediately or keep it until autumn, or, belt and braces, both. Don't forget to mark the place where you saw the white bluebell with other strings round adjacent trees. I have sown seeds of wild white bluebells in the past - you need a lot of patience if you're going to do this, because your seed will take about three/four years to come to flowering; but though I've done it in the past, I never thought to sow my own white bluebell seed to find out if the next generation came true. If wishes were horses...




